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#### **Course Overview**

This immersive and enriching course invites students to explore the rich tapestry of Korean history, culture, and society. The journey begins with a two-week virtual module that establishes a solid foundation by examining Korea's history from the Paleolithic period (circa 700,000 years ago) through 1979. This preparatory phase is followed by three transformative weeks in Korea. Participants will embark on extensive tours of key historical museums and culturally significant sites, engaging deeply with Korea's past through films and documentaries. This exploration traces Korea's evolution up to 1979, offering a vivid and comprehensive understanding of its historical narrative. The final phase of the program focuses on Korea's vibrant musical heritage. Students will spend two weeks at the <u>Jindo National Gugak Center</u>, immersing themselves in traditional Korean music. This hands-on experience provides valuable insights into Korea's cultural significance and musical traditions. The course offers a compelling backdrop for exploring Korea's renowned landmarks and deepening cultural connections.

#### Pre- &/or Co-Requisites

Students must not have any prior registration for KOR courses at Georgia Tech.

#### **Course Goals and Learning Outcomes**

# 1. Virtual Learning Integration:

Students will complete the virtual pre-course, demonstrating a thorough understanding of Korea's history from the Paleolithic period to 1979. This foundational knowledge will be essential for enhancing their learning experience during their time in Korea.

#### 2. Historical Awareness:

Students will gain a comprehensive understanding of Korean history, recognizing the significance of key historical events and figures and their impact on the evolution of Korean society.

#### 3. Cultural Familiarization:

Students will develop a nuanced appreciation of Korean culture, including traditional music, art, and customs, and understand how these elements reflect and shape societal values.

# 4. Music Appreciation:

Through active participation in workshops and performances at the Jindo National Gugak Center, students will explore traditional Korean music, gaining insights into its cultural significance.

#### 5. Social Values:

Students will analyze how Korea's historical narrative has shaped its contemporary identity and societal values, connecting these insights to broader themes in global history and cultural studies.

#### 6. Cross-Cultural Communication:

Students will engage in meaningful interactions with local communities, practicing cultural exchange, and developing intercultural communication skills.

# 7. Reflective Journaling:

Students will maintain a reflective journal throughout the program, recording their observations, learning experiences, and personal growth.

#### **Course Format**

The course blends virtual learning and in-person experiences, structured as follows:

# 1. Virtual Module (Weeks 1-2):

A two-week online course designed to build foundational knowledge of Korea's history through historical films, documentaries, and readings.

# 2. In-Country Module (Weeks 3-5):

- Week 3: Extensive tours of historical sites and museums, providing a firsthand exploration of Korea's history from the Paleolithic period to 1979.
- Weeks 4-5: A two-week immersive experience at the Jindo National Gugak Center, involving traditional musical instrument training, percussion quartet sessions, and cultural explorations at local historical sites.

### **Assessment Components**

# 1. Class Participation and Performance Assessment (40%):

Evaluation of skills acquired in traditional musical instrument and Samulnori performances, as well as attendance and active participation in class and practice sessions.

### 2. Films/Documentaries and Reading Discussions on Canvas (20%):

Engagement with assigned materials to deepen understanding before site visits, assessed through online discussions and reflections.

### 3. Reflective Journal (10%):

Students will maintain a journal documenting their observations, learning experiences, and personal reflections throughout the course.

# 4. Final Project (30%):

Students will develop at least 10 YouTube shorts introducing the entire "Exploring Traditional Korea 2025" experience for future participants. The project will include:

- o YouTube Shorts (maximum 59 sec): Briefly introduce what you observe and learn each day.
- You can upload your final project directly <u>here</u> by 9:00 pm on June 27th (F).
- o It would be great to make your YouTube Shorts more engaging by adding some visual materials.
