1. "Intensive Advanced Russian" (3 credits, RUSS 3961)

This course is dedicated to developing students' aural/ oral communications skills, capitalizing on the rich linguistic surroundings to produce a qualitative jump in speaking ability. Special focus is given to discussion of cultural differences between the United States and Russia.

2. "Advanced Reading and Composition: Current Affairs, Business, Science and Technology" (3 credits, RUSS 3692)

Students work to develop more sophisticated syntax, and grammatical structures which receive high frequency usage in written texts are the object of special focus. Reading texts are keyed to student level and come primarily from the areas of current affairs, business and economics, and science and technology.

3. "Contemporary Russia" (3 credits, RUSS 3695)

Lecture course in English on Russian domestic and foreign policy and economic development issues. Meets four hours per week. Taught by Russian faculty of ANE, the Higher School of Economics and Moscow State University. Research project in Russian.

At 4th-year level: RUSS 4692 and 4693: "Advanced Intensive Russian II and III"
